



(A1 Would you like...? I'd like...)

Would you like...?

- We use **Would you like...?** to **offer** something or to **invite** somebody to do something. **Would you like...?** = 'Do you want...?'
- **_Would you like some cake?_** (=Do you want some cake?)
- **_Would you like some coffee?**
- **_Would you like to go to the cinema?_** (=Do you want to go to the cinema?)
- **_Where would you like to go?**

I'd like

- We use **I'd like** (=I would like) to talk about something that we want or something that we want to do.
- **_I'd like** some water, please. (=I want some water.)
- **_I'd like** more information about this product.
- **_I'd like** to go to the zoo. (=I want to go to the zoo.)
- **_I'd like** to have a lemonade.

Like

- We use **like + things or people** to say that we think these things or people are nice or good.
- **_I like** coffee. (I think coffee is good.)
- **_I like** John_. (I think John is nice.)
- We use **like + -ing** verb to say that we enjoy doing something.
- **_I like** dancing. (I enjoy dancing.)
- **_I like** going to the cinema. (I enjoy going to the cinema.)
- We use **do** in questions.
- **_Do you like** coffee?
- **_Do you like** going to the cinema?

Like vs Would like

- Compare the following sentences:
- **_I like tea_.** (=I think tea is good.)
- **_I'd like some tea._** (=I want some tea.)
- **_Do you like tea?_** (=Do you think tea is good?)
- **_Would you like some tea?_** (=Do you want some tea?)
- We use **like + -ing** verb or **+ to-infinitive** and **would like + to-infinitive**. Compare:
- **_I like going to the cinema._** (=I enjoy going to the cinema.)
- **_I'd like to go to the cinema._** (=I want to go to the cinema.)
- **_Do you like going to the cinema?_** (=Do you enjoy going to the cinema?)
- **_Would you like to go to the cinema?_** (=Do you want to go to the cinema?)
